DR. DARCIA NARVAEZ, PH.D,

Dr. Narvaez' research explores questions of species-typical and species-atypical development in terms of wellbeing, morality, and sustainable wisdom. She examines how early life experience (the evolved nest) influences moral functioning and wellbeing in children and adults. She integrates evolutionary, anthropological, neurobiological, clinical, developmental, and education sciences in her work.

Questions that interest her include: How does early experience shape human nature? What do sustainable indigenous societies have to teach the modern world? What types of moral orientations do individuals develop in species-typical and -atypical environments? What is indigenous ecological wisdom and how do we cultivate it? How can educators and parents foster optimal development, wellbeing, and communal imagination? Her 2014 book won the 2015 William James Book Award from the APA and the 2017 Expanded Reason Award for research. She is a fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science, the American Psychological Association, and the American Educational Research Association. She hosts the website <u>EvolvedNest.Org</u> and is president of <u>KindredMedia.org</u>.



PAULINE SAKAMOTO, MS, RN, PHN

Pauline Sakamoto's nursing career in milk banking started as a volunteer donor to the Mothers' Milk Bank in San Jose 35 years ago. Previously, she worked at the County Health Department of San Bernardino as a Public Health Nurse in the largest county in the US covering the Hi Desert. She was also employed by the CA State Department of Health, Fiscal Intermediary Management Division for Medi-Cal. Her experience with the nonprofit San Jose Milk Bank for 35 years included processing and operations, the screening of donors and dispensing of donor human milk for inpatient and outpatient services, administration of the San Jose Mothers' Milk Bank for over 20 years and concurrently leadership roles in the Human Milk Banking Association of North America.

Currently, she serves on multiple committees within HMBANA regarding policies and standards, auditing member banks, and reviews legislative and state statutes on milk banking and lactation. She has been representing HMBANA at the US Breastfeeding Committee for over 9 years and served on the Board of USBC for 6 years. Internationally, in 2012-14, she served on PATH's Milk Banking Policy Group and continues to work internationally on issues on processing and safety. She has stepped down from the Executive Director position at the Milk Bank in 2019 but continue to pursue her passion on milk banking and Lactation.

Lisa Amir is a medical practitioner with a long-standing interest in women's health. Having qualified as a lactation consultant in 1989, Lisa continues to work in breastfeeding medicine at the Royal Women's Hospital. She is conducting research in the area of breastfeeding - from rates and determinants of breastfeeding, to nipple and breast pain in breastfeeding women, to use of medicines for breastfeeding women.

DR. LUKE GRZESKOWIAK, PHD BPHARM, ASSOCIATE PROFESSOR AT FLINDERS UNIVERSITY, AUSTRALIA

Luke's clinical and research ambitions are to enhance maternal and newborn health outcomes through supporting quality use of medicines and the development and promotion of more efficacious, safer, and personalised pharmacotherapy approaches. Luke completed his PhD in Pharmacy/Pharmacoepidemiology in 2012 which focused on evaluating different approaches towards investigating the long-term effects of medication use during pregnancy. His current clinical/research interests include perinatal pharmacoepidemiology, obstetric and neonatal pharmacology, medication safety, and evidence-based medicine.

He is currently involved in a wide variety of studies including:

- Improving the identification and pharmacological management of lactation insufficiency in mothers of preterm infants
- Exploring outcomes associated with maternal asthma and the development of strategies for optimising clinical management and related pregnancy outcomes
- Optimising intravenous iron therapies in pregnancy
- Reducing the risk of medication errors in neonatal care
- Enhancing the role of pharmacists in perinatal pharmacy practice
